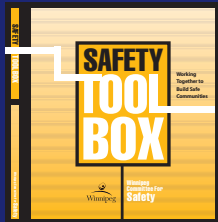

Community Building Safety Awards Graffiti Art Programming Inc.

Did you know that the Graffiti Art's programs encourages at-risk youth, often in trouble with the law to express their talents in constructive rather than destructive ways? Graffiti Art offers free after school activities, provide mentors and support workers to youth. The Graffiti Art's program develops murals in the South Point Douglas and other areas.

Tenant and Landlord Cooperation (TLC)

The TLC program posts signs on good places to rent. These signs ensure landlords and tenants maintain buildings according to the TLC neighbourhood standards.

The TLC program is the first of its kind to involve landlords, tenants, businesses and an entire neighbourhood to work toward maintaining their own housing standards.

This program originated in the West Broadway Neighbourhood Housing Resource Centre, but is being duplicated in the Spence and North End, including Point Douglas neighbourhoods, as well as across Canada. Good luck to everybody!

Community Safety Awards Downtown Watch Ambassador Program

This is a volunteer program that works alongside the regular Downtown Watch. They are the extra eyes and ears of the Winnipeg Police Service. This program consists of 100 volunteers. These volunteers deal with panhandlers, intoxicated people, traffic problems, and downtown business' minor offences on a daily basis. *Thanks for your hard work!*

The Winnipeg Committee for Safety reviewed the Draft Zoning By-law as part of the Comprehensive Zoning By-law Review Process in late 2005. The Winnipeg Committee for Safety followed up that initial review by meeting with the Winnipeg Zoning By-law Review Consultant team on January 17, 2006. At that meeting the Committee discussed how the proposed changes in the Draft Zoning By-law Review could help create safer neighbourhoods."
