

Our Purpose

The Winnipeg Committee for Safety (WCFS) was created by Council in 1999 to support, assist, stimulate and mobilize the work of Winnipeg's neighbourhoods on safety concerns.

Approximately 20 people with an interest and/or experience, in crime prevention volunteer their time for monthly meetings, networking and other activities to encourage safety. Representatives from the Winnipeg Police Service, Community Services, Manitoba Justice, and the City Clerk's Department are also represented on the committee.

The WCFS has five working groups: Youth Committee, Downtown Winnipeg Committee for Safety, Safety Tool Box, Neighbourhood Forum Committee, and Conflict Resolution Training Committee.

Our Highlights

Leslie Lindberg from Lindberg Consultants completed an External Evaluation for the Winnipeg Committee for Safety in August, 2003. Recommendations from the report include:

- ▲ move forward with the strategic planning process
- ▲ continue to offer advice and facilitation services to community organizations as and when requested
- ▲ create a Marketing Strategy to raise the profile of the WCFS and the Safety Toolbox increasing access to this valuable resource for groups and individuals
- ▲ develop a template for team problem-solving and include action to implement for Community Conversation
- ▲ provide links from WCFS Website to safety initiatives and community development research and best practices
- ▲ create a facilitated forum for community members to meet, share information and network.
- ▲ expand the database of organizations, initiatives and programs regarding Community Safety

▲ *Al Holmes from Sequus International* facilitated the development of a detailed **Strategic Plan** to set our goals and priorities for the year. The following areas of Strategic Focus were identified: hosting an Annual Community Forum, Capacity Building in Communities, Focus on Youth, Focused Assistance and Support Services, Evaluation, Marketing and C.P.T.E.D. (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design).

▲ **Domestic Violence Forum: Practical Ideas and Everyday Solutions** took place on March 7, 2003 at Magnus Eliason Recreation Centre. The purpose of this forum was to discuss positive changes for women, men and children affected by domestic violence. It attracted approximately 140 attendees including: community residents, representatives from community organizations, high school students, government representatives, police and politicians.

Small Group Workshops and Panel Presentations addressed issues such as bullying, helping youth stay out of gangs, zero tolerance for abusive relationships, avoiding violent behaviours, and personal and organizations' experiences with violence.

▲ conducted a survey of Winnipeg youth about safety concerns to develop both crisis and non-crisis safety resources- 314 inner city youth between 10 and 24 years from the Downtown, North End/Point Douglas, Tyndall Park, and Elmwood areas were surveyed in July and August, 2003.

▲ published the Tenant and Landlord Cooperation Guide detailing legal rights and responsibilities with an aim of promoting close working relationships between landlords and tenants, particularly from low income neighbourhoods. Funded by Winnipeg Inner-city Research Alliance, and Winnipeg Housing and Homelessness Initiative.

- ▲ participated in Restorative Justice Week, November 16 – 23, and organized a panel on the new Youth Criminal Justice Act, with the Oblate Justice and Peace Committee.
- ▲ assisted in the creation of Justice Solutions, a new youth justice committee in the north end.
- ▲ provided neighbourhood safety presentations to numerous groups that included discussion of a successful community building model (West Broadway), an overview of the Safety Toolbox and safety audits as well as other articles and information regarding safety.
- ▲ distributed hundreds of Safety Toolboxes and thousands of pamphlets.
- ▲ supported the Downtown Winnipeg BIZ's "Change for the Better" campaign

In Progress

A variety of initiatives and activities are already being planned for 2004. Examples of these include:

- ▲ hosting a free neighbourhood forum called "Safety! The Challenge" that will take place April 17th, 2004 at R.B. Russell Vocational High School. The forum will be an exchange of ideas among individuals, community groups and agencies on how to make a difference in promoting safer communities. It will include information booths, workshops and keynote speakers.
- ▲ presenting the WCFS Safety Audit Awards to recognize neighbourhoods, businesses, organizations and residences for implementing crime prevention through environmental design (C.P.T.E.D.) principles. The awards will be presented at the Neighbourhood Safety Forum on April 17th.
- ▲ implementing the results of the youth safety survey by developing tools to assist youth and providing a number of resources about issues touching on safety. These tools may include address books, posters, a youth-designed interactive website or other items as identified by youth. Part of implementation will also include organizing Youth Safety Councils in the inner-city and other areas.
- ▲ creating a new youth website to provide information on safety, health, education, bullying, crisis, sex, pregnancy, etc. Conducting a youth website poster contest with youth from all school divisions in Winnipeg to promote our new youth friendly website: www.communityyouthconnections.ca
- ▲ organizing ongoing conflict resolution training for communities to help provide problem solving and mediation skills to neighbourhoods.
- ▲ preparing a library of safety information accessible to the public through the WCFS's website and CDs.
